# YOUR DETAILED DAY BY DAY ITINERARY

## DAY 2

### ST PETERSBURG

- **Tour of the city highlights including time spent in the Hermitage Museum.**

Today you have a tour of St. Petersburg's highlights which begins with a visit to the iconic Hermitage Museum, one of the world's largest and most prestigious art museums. Spend the morning exploring the Winter Palace and its vast collections, including masterpieces by Rembrandt, Da Vinci, and Michelangelo.

Next, take a leisurely walk along the Palace Square, admiring its neoclassical architecture, the Alexander Column, and the grandeur of the surrounding buildings. From there, stroll to the Church of the Saviour on Spilled Blood, a stunning example of Russian Orthodox architecture with its colourful onion domes and intricate mosaics.

This afternoon, visit the St. Isaac's Cathedral, famous for its massive gold dome and impressive views of the city from its colonnade. 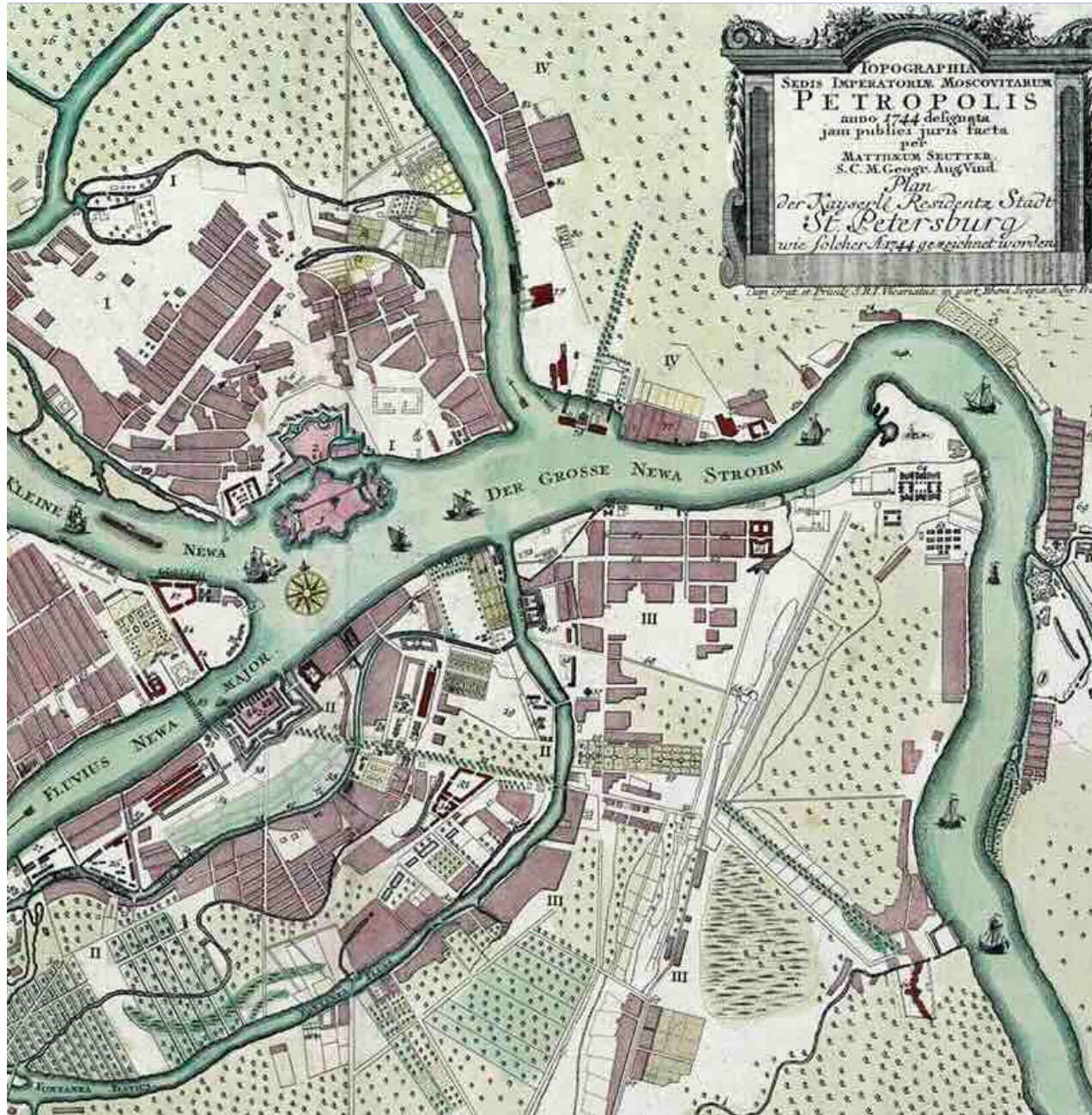

# THE BUILDING OF ST PETERSBURG



## ST PETERSBURG - DID YOU KNOW ?

- St. Petersburg was founded by Tsar Peter the Great in 1703 as part of his vision to modernise Russia and open a “window to the West.” He chose the site along the Neva River for its strategic access to the Baltic Sea.
- The city was constructed on swampy land in the delta of the Neva River. This meant extensive groundwork was needed, and workers had to drain swamps and lay massive wooden foundations for stability, making construction extremely difficult and dangerous.
- The site of St. Petersburg was originally part of Sweden until Peter the Great seized it during the Great Northern War (1700–1721). The city was built partly as a military base to secure Russia’s presence on the Baltic Sea.
- Peter the Great sought to model the city after Western European capitals like Amsterdam and Venice, emphasising canals, grand boulevards, and baroque architecture. He hired architects from Italy, France, and other parts of Europe to design the city.
- To ensure enough stone was available for St. Petersburg’s construction, Peter the Great banned the use of stone for new building projects in other parts of Russia. Only St. Petersburg could use stone during its early years.



# YOUR DETAILED DAY BY DAY ITINERARY

## DAY 3

### ST PETERSBURG

- Private tour by car out of the city to Pushkin & Pavlosk palaces.

Today you have a private tour by car to Pushkin (Tsarskoye Selo) and Pavlovsk Palaces offering an intimate and luxurious journey into Russia's imperial past. Begin your day with a comfortable drive from St. Petersburg to the Catherine Palace in Pushkin, known for its breathtaking Baroque architecture and the stunning Amber Room, a masterpiece of amber panels, gold leaf, and mirrors. Enjoy a guided tour of the palace's opulent interiors, including the lavish Grand Hall, followed by a peaceful walk through the surrounding Catherine Park with its elegant pavilions and ornamental lakes.

Afterward, a short drive takes you to Pavlovsk Palace, the former residence of Emperor Paul I. This neoclassical masterpiece offers a more intimate yet equally fascinating experience. Explore the palace's art-filled rooms, including the beautiful State Rooms and the emperor's private chambers.

Following your palace tour, take a leisurely stroll through the Pavlovsk Park, one of Europe's largest landscaped parks, with charming rivers, bridges, and pavilions. # YOUR DETAILED DAY BY DAY ITINERARY

## DAY 4

### MOSCOW

- St Petersburg to Moscow by high speed train & evening Moskva river cruise.

Free time before a late morning transfer by private car with an English speaking driver to the “Sapsan” train to Moscow. The journey takes just 4 hours with an early evening arrival in Moscow, the political and economic centre of this vast country.

Moscow, founded in 1147, grew from a small medieval town to the political and cultural heart of Russia. It became the capital in 1547 under Ivan the Terrible, survived invasions like Napoleon’s in 1812, and transformed into a global power hub during Soviet rule, retaining its status today as Russia’s capital.

Your English speaking driver will be waiting for you at the front of the train for your transfer from the station by private car to your hotel.

This evening you have a cruise along the Moskva River with stunning views of Moscow’s iconic landmarks, including the Kremlin, St. Basil’s Cathedral, and the Cathedral of Christ the Saviour. As the city’s skyline illuminates at night, the tranquil ride provides a unique perspective on Moscow’s mix of historic and modern architecture.

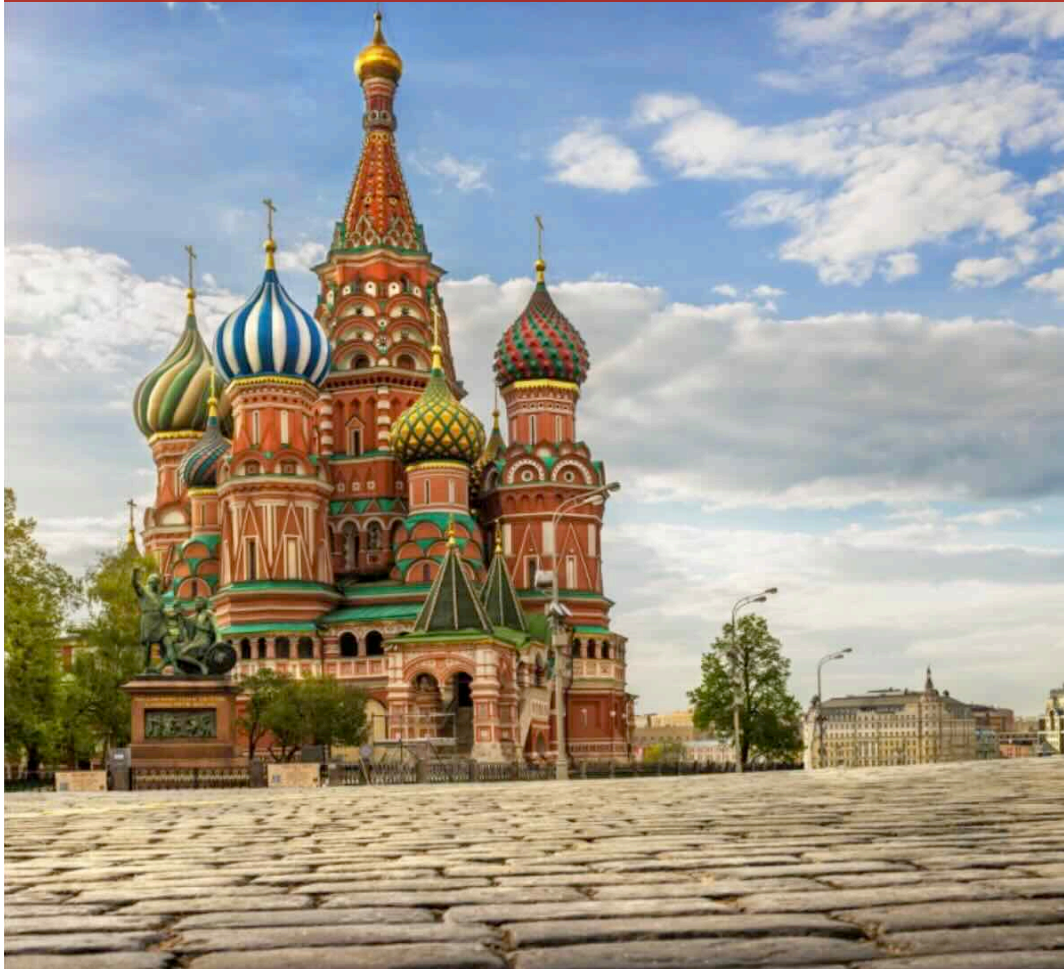

# YOUR DETAILED DAY BY DAY ITINERARY

## DAY 5

### MOSCOW

- City tour including the Kremlin & Armoury, Metro & Red Square.

Today you have a full day tour of Moscow which begins with a visit to Red Square, where you'll see iconic sites like St. Basil's Cathedral and the Lenin Mausoleum. Next, head to the Kremlin for a guided tour of its historic cathedrals, palaces, and the Armoury Museum, showcasing royal treasures, Fabergé eggs, and ceremonial weaponry.

In the afternoon, dive into the architectural beauty of the Moscow Metro, known for its opulent, museum-like stations such as Komsomolskaya and Mayakovskaya. Conclude the day by strolling through Alexander Garden for a visit to the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, offering a fitting end to a day filled with Moscow's historic and cultural grandeur.

Return to your hotel to relax with the evening free.

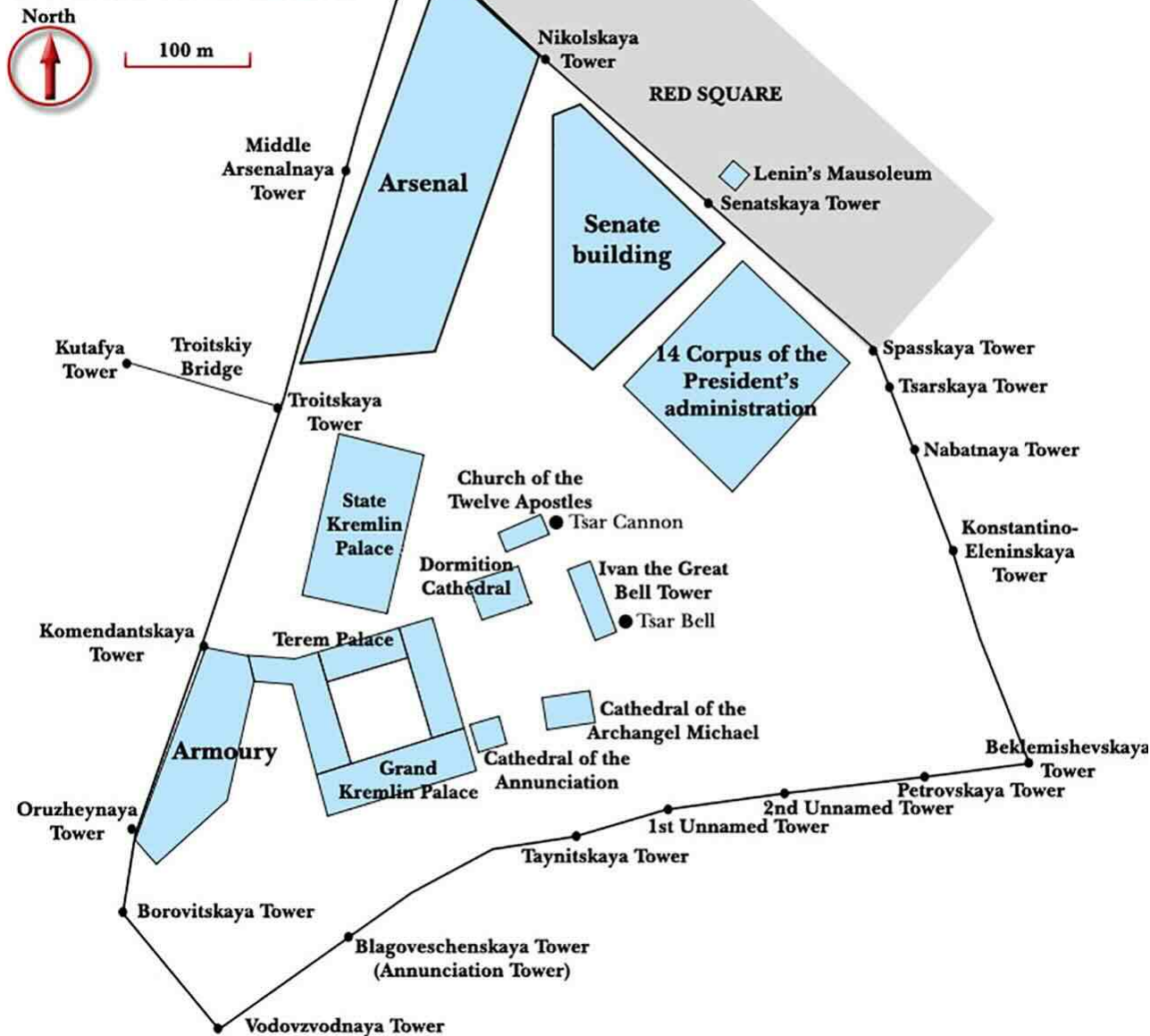

# MOSCOW'S KREMLIN

## The Moscow KREMLIN



### MOSCOW'S KREMLIN - DID YOU KNOW ?

- The Kremlin is the oldest part of Moscow, with origins dating back to 1156, when it was a wooden fortress built by Prince Yuri Dolgorukiy. It has been rebuilt and expanded multiple times throughout its history.
- Covering an area of 27.5 hectares (68 acres), the Moscow Kremlin is the largest medieval fortress still in use today. Its walls stretch for 2.25 kilometres (1.4 miles), and it includes several palaces, cathedrals, and government buildings.
- The Kremlin walls are over 6 meters (20 feet) thick in places and contain 20 towers, each with its unique history. The Spasskaya Tower, added in 1491, is the most famous, featuring a clock and often seen as the main entrance to the Kremlin.
- Although not inside the Kremlin walls, Lenin's Mausoleum on Red Square is closely associated with the Kremlin. It houses the embalmed body of Vladimir Lenin, the leader of the 1917 Russian Revolution.
- There are numerous secret tunnels and rooms beneath the Kremlin. Some of these were built for military defence, while others were intended as escape routes for the tsars and Soviet leaders.
- The Kremlin has served as the political and spiritual heart of Russia for centuries. It was the residence of the tsars, the seat of Soviet power, and today, it houses the official residence of the President of Russia.

# YOUR DETAILED DAY BY DAY ITINERARY

## DAY 6

### MOSCOW

- Free time in the city before an afternoon departure Eastbound!

Free time to explore Moscow before your departure on the Trans-Mongolian train. The city has much to offer whatever the weather from the famous museums such as Pushkin Fine Arts and Tretyakov Art Gallery to more outdoor areas including the Park of the Fallen Idols and Novodevitchy Convent.

Of course, if the weather is not so good Moscow is one of the few cities where a day spent on the metro is a tourist attraction with many beautiful stations to visit and all for the price of a single ticket! For relaxing we recommend the bars, galleries and cafes of the Red October district or the fabulous Gorky Park.

Transfer to the station for a early afternoon departure from Moscow's Kazanskaya station. Settle into your compartment as the suburbs of Moscow are replaced by forest and countryside.

# YOUR DETAILED DAY BY DAY ITINERARY

## DAY 7

### EKATERINBURG

- Day on the train before an arrival in Ekaterinburg.

With luck the gentle rhythm of the train led to a good night's sleep! A full day on the train through a region of farms, small towns and villages interspersed with birch forests.

Towards the end of the day you cross the Europe-Asia continental border arriving in Ekaterinburg a short time afterwards.

Ekaterinburg is a more representative experience of a Russian city than, say, Moscow and has a rich and fascinating history including the last days of the Romanovs. It is surrounded by beautiful, rolling countryside dotted with traditional Siberian villages.

Transfer to your hotel to overnight and rest up before tomorrow's tour.

# YOUR DETAILED DAY BY DAY ITINERARY

## DAY 8

### EKATERINBURG

- Full day tour into the rolling Ural countryside to visit a village.

Today we drive out of the city to one of the photogenic country villages that are scattered across the rolling scenery of the Ural mountains. Here we see a traditional Siberian “izba” house - a style suited to the often extreme environment - that can be seen right across Siberia.

We also visit the local museum to learn about everyday life in this part of Russia and listen to a concert of local folk music. There will be time to explore the village with your guide and you will also enjoy a traditional Siberian homestyle lunch often using locally produced and seasonal ingredients.

Return to Ekaterinburg late afternoon with a free evening.

**NOTE:** Depending on the day of your visit this trip will be to either Koptelovo, Nizhnyaya Sinyachikha or Mironovo village all approximately 150 km from Ekaterinburg.

The Romanov dynasty ruled Russia for over 300 years, from 1613 to 1917, beginning with Mikhail Romanov and ending with Nicholas II. The family came to power during a time of unrest known as the Time of Troubles, and Mikhail Romanov was elected Tsar in 1613, restoring stability to the country.

Over the centuries, the Romanovs expanded Russia into a vast empire. Under rulers like Peter the Great and Catherine the Great, the empire modernised, engaged with Europe, and grew in power. Peter introduced Western reforms and established St. Petersburg, while Catherine expanded Russia's territory and promoted culture.

The last Romanov tsar, Nicholas II, ascended the throne in 1894. His reign saw significant challenges, including the Russo-Japanese War (1904-1905), Bloody Sunday (1905), and the Russian Revolution of 1905. Despite efforts at reform, discontent grew. The Bolshevik Revolution in 1917 led to Nicholas abdicating the throne.

In 1918, the Bolsheviks executed Nicholas II, his wife Alexandra, and their five children, ending the Romanov dynasty. The family's downfall was due to political unrest, social inequality, and failure to adapt to the changing political climate, marking the end of imperial Russia.

## THE ROMANOVS IN EKATERINBURG - A TIMELINE

- April 30, 1918: The Romanov family—Tsar Nicholas II, Tsarina Alexandra, and their five children—arrived in Ekaterinburg after being transferred from Tobolsk by the Bolsheviks.
- They were imprisoned in the Ipatiev House, also known as the “House of Special Purpose.” The house was heavily guarded, and the family's movements were restricted.
- The Romanovs were confined to two rooms. Their personal freedoms and comforts gradually diminished; they were forbidden from interacting with guards and could only go outside for limited walks.
- Heightened Security: In June 1918, the Bolsheviks increased the security around Ipatiev House. Windows were boarded up, and outside communications were cut off, signalling the impending end.
- Bolshevik leaders feared a possible rescue attempt by the advancing White Army, which prompted them to consider the execution of the Romanov family to prevent their liberation.
- July 16, 1918: The Bolsheviks received orders from Moscow to execute the Romanov family, concerned over White Army movements in the region.
- The bodies were initially buried in a shallow grave in the Koptyaki Forest, near Ekaterinburg. The burial site remained a secret for decades.
- In 1991, the Romanov family's remains were discovered, identified through DNA testing, and reburied in St. Petersburg in 1998.



# YOUR DETAILED DAY BY DAY ITINERARY

## DAY 9

### EKATERINBURG

- City tour, Romanov's secret graves, Europe Asia border & departure.

This morning your guide will take you on a 3 hour walking tour of the city's highlights. Stop at the central square and see statues of Ekaterinburg's founders and leaders and learn local stories, legends (and a few jokes!) related to them. Continue to the 1905 Revolution square before the most compelling story will be told at the beautiful Church of Spilled Blood located at the Romanovs' Death Site and Chapel of St Elizabeth. See views from the Hill of Ascension and visit the powerful Afghanistan memorial at the Square of the Red Army.

After lunch (own arrangement) drive 15 km north-west to a monastery dedicated to the Romanov's family located on the spot where the Bolsheviks tried to hide the corpses of the Tsar and his family in a secret grave. Continue on to the continental border of Europe and Asia 20 km west of the city. On the way we make a short stop at the Memorial of Victims of the GULAGs. The Main Obelisk "Between Europe & Asia" allows you to straddle the continental divide and you also get a Certificate with a glass of sparkling wine!

Return to the city with some free time before an evening transfer to the station for your onward train. From this point on you have entered Siberia!

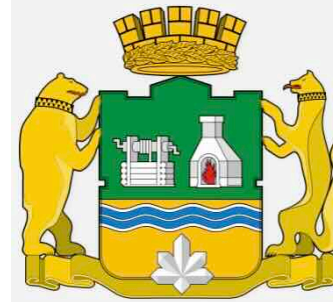

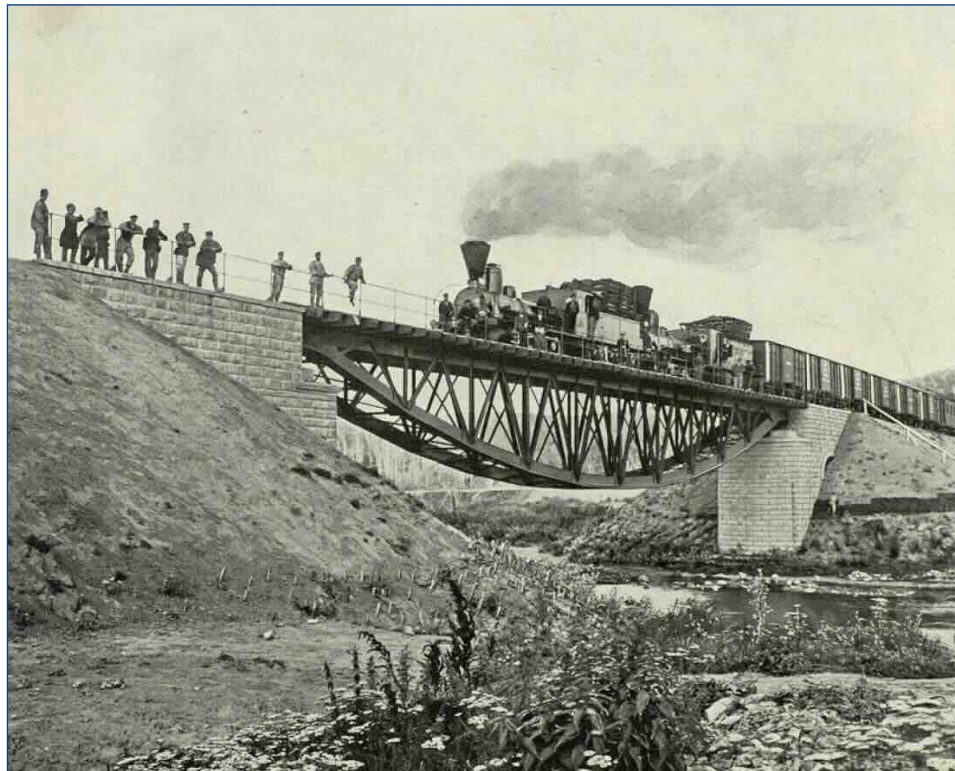
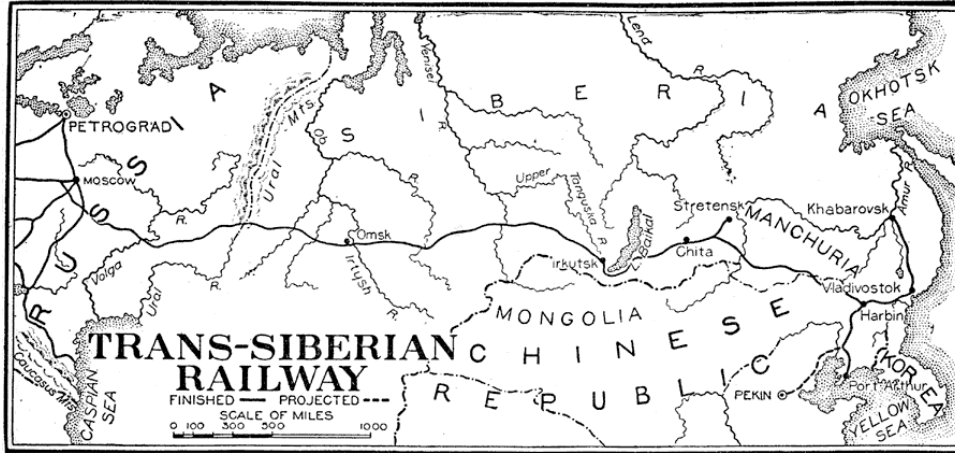

# THE BUILDING OF THE TRANS-SIBERIAN



## CONSTRUCTION OF THE TRANS-SIBERIAN - DID YOU KNOW ?

- The Trans-Siberian Railway is the longest railway line in the world, stretching over 9,289 kilometres (5,772 miles) from Moscow to Vladivostok. It crosses eight time zones.
- Construction of the railway began in 1891 under the rule of Tsar Alexander III. His son, Nicholas II, who would later become Russia's last tsar, was tasked with overseeing the project.
- The railway was constructed in phases, with work starting in both the west (near Moscow) and the east (near Vladivostok). Different sections were completed at various times, and the entire line was finished in 1916.
- The construction faced numerous geographical challenges, including crossing mountains, forests, and swamps. For example, engineers had to build bridges across major rivers like the Ob and Amur, and deal with the extreme cold of Siberian winters.
- Before the railway line around Lake Baikal was completed, trains had to be loaded onto ferries to cross the lake. A special icebreaker ferry, the Baikal, was built to operate in winter when the lake froze.
- The Amur Bridge near Khabarovsk, completed in 1916, was the final piece of the Trans-Siberian puzzle, linking the entire route without interruption. It spans 2.6 kilometres (1.6 miles) and was one of the most challenging engineering feats of the project.
- The construction of the Trans-Siberian Railway was extremely expensive and was partly funded by international loans, especially from France. The railway was seen as a crucial strategic asset to expand Russian influence in the Far East.
- The Trans-Siberian Railway has been continually modernised. The electrification of the railway started in 1929 and was completed in 2002, allowing for faster and more efficient trains to operate on the line.

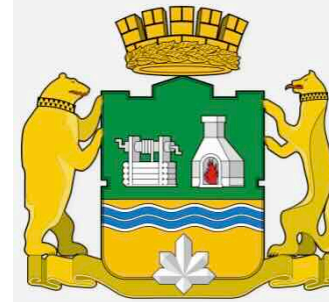
- Continue the journey to Irkutsk with increasingly scenic views.

- Arrive in Irkutsk with a transfer to Olkhon Island by car and boat.

Arrival in Irkutsk, regarded as the modern day cultural capital of Siberia, famed for its traditional wooden architecture, complimented by a vibrant cafe and restaurant culture.

First we go for a good breakfast to set you up for today's journey. After breakfast start the trip to Olkhon island by private car or minibus finishing the journey with a short boat trip to reach the island itself. Note that in the summer months there can be a queue for the ferry and it is not possible to pre-book a place on it in advance.

Transport on to Khuzhir village, the island's main settlement with a population of 1,500 people and check-in to the hotel before seeing the sunset at Shaman cape - note it is also possible to organise a 2 hour boat trip to see the sunset from the lake for an additional local payment.

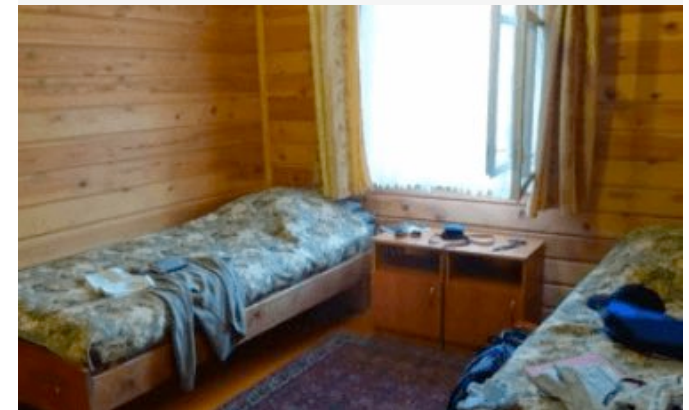

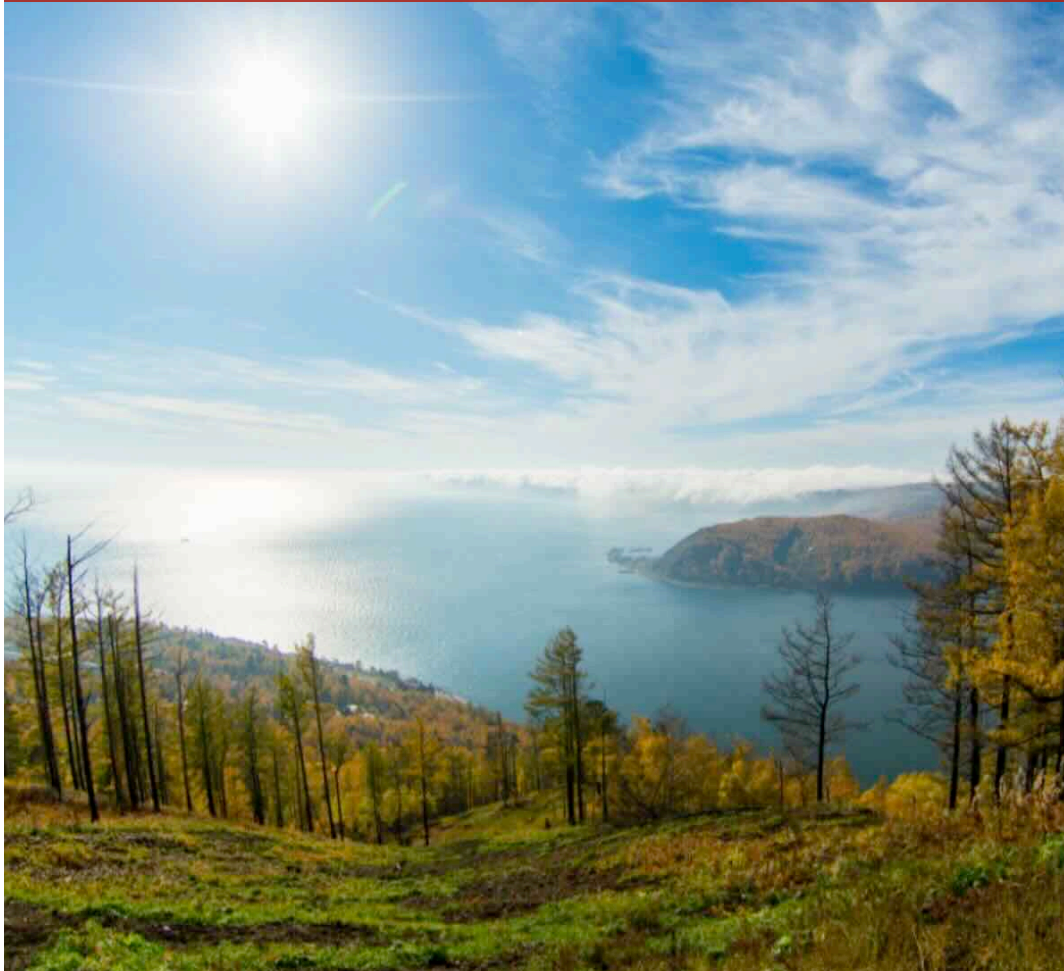

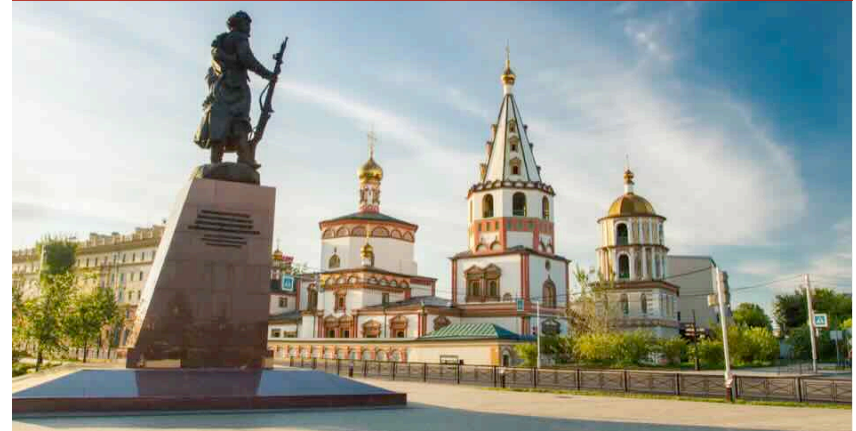

## DAY 13

### **OLKHON**

- Explore the highlights and viewpoints of Olkhon by car.

Today we explore the island by private car. At 72 km long, Olkhon is the largest island in Lake Baikal and one of the best places from which to appreciate the serene vastness of the lake. It has varied scenery ranging from sandy beaches to the jagged cliffs of Choboi Cape.

The island is also considered one of the five poles of Shamanic energy by the Buryat people and there is certainly something spiritual about this jewel of Baikal.

#### **IMPORTANT NOTES ABOUT THIS OLKHON ISLAND STOPOVER**

Accommodation on Olkhon is in the traditional Siberian style of log cabins, separate, outside buildings for drop (not flush) toilets and a Russian banya (sauna) for washing. For most choosing to come here this is all part of the experience and feedback is overwhelmingly positive. However, if it feels a bit too basic for you we can offer more comfortable stopover options - just not on Olkhon Island.

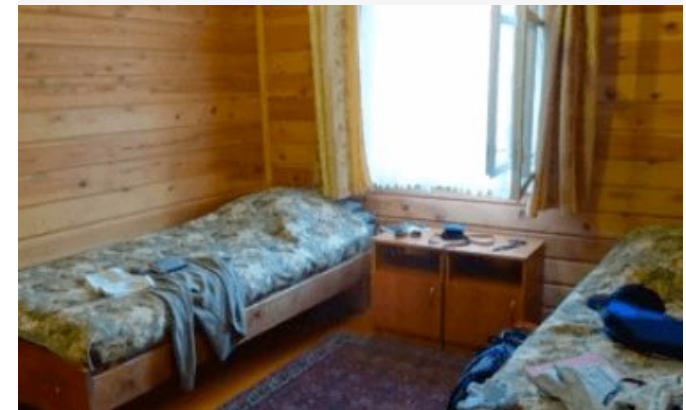

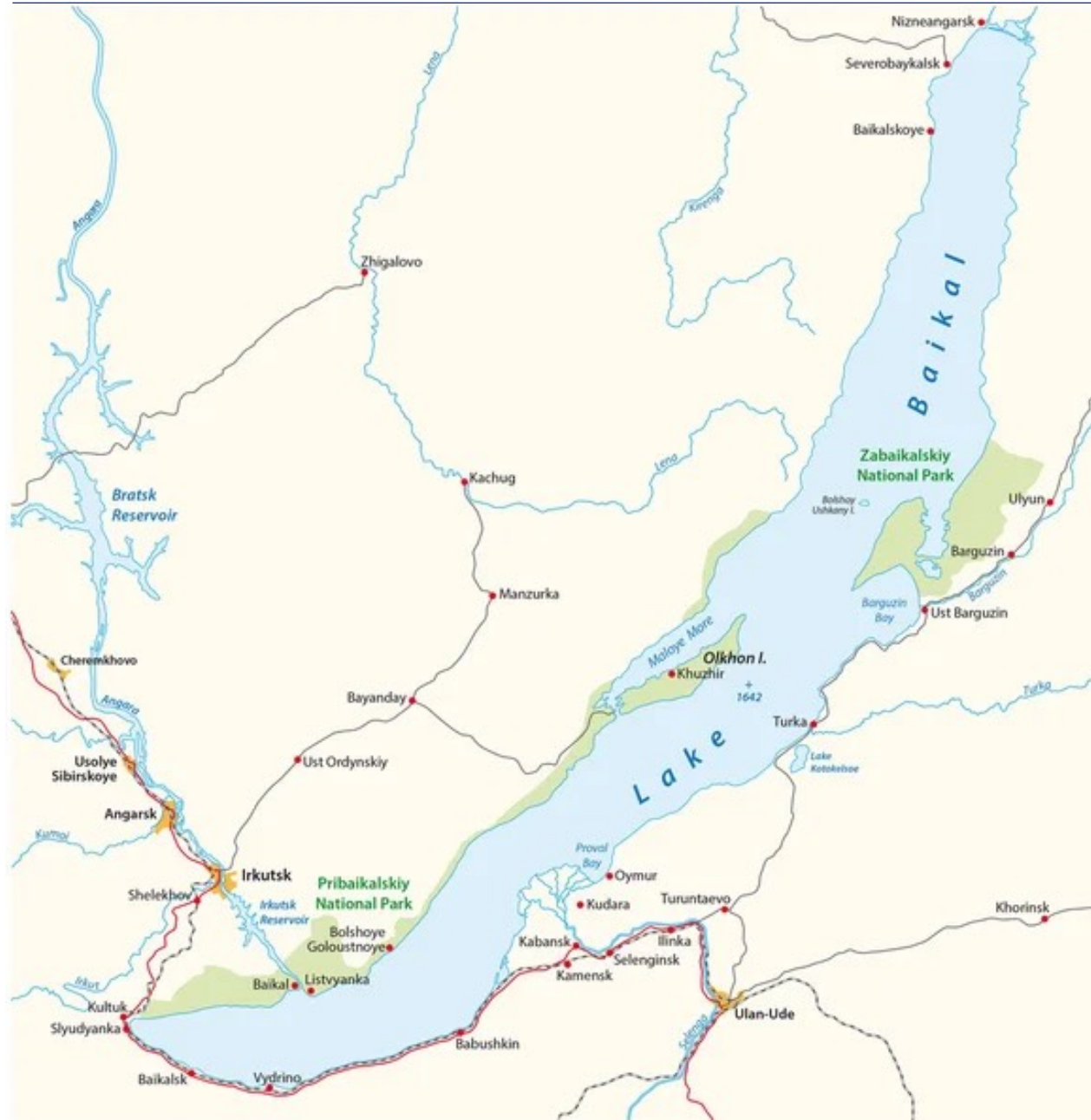

## LAKE BAIKAL - DID YOU KNOW ?

- Lake Baikal is the world's oldest freshwater lake, estimated to be around 25-30 million years old. Its age makes it a unique natural laboratory for studying evolution and geological processes.
- With a depth of 1,642 meters (5,387 feet), Lake Baikal is the deepest lake in the world, holding about 20% of the world's unfrozen freshwater supply.
- The lake hosts over 3,700 species of plants and animals, two-thirds of which are endemic, meaning they can't be found anywhere else. The most famous is the Baikal seal (nerpa), the only freshwater seal species in the world.
- The water in Lake Baikal is incredibly clear, especially during winter. In some areas, you can see up to 40 meters (131 feet) down into the lake.
- Lake Baikal is a rift lake, formed due to tectonic plate movements. It's still expanding, at a rate of about 2 cm (0.8 inches) per year, meaning it could eventually become an ocean over millions of years.
- During the winter, the lake freezes over, and its ice can reach up to 1.5 meters thick. The ice is so transparent that people can see fish and plant life beneath it.
- For centuries, Lake Baikal has been considered sacred by indigenous people, especially the Buryat population.

- Drive back to Irkutsk for a city tour and free time.

After breakfast we make our way back to Irkutsk by boat and private mini-bus or car arriving in the afternoon at your hotel.

Once settled in you will have a 2 hour walking tour of the city centre including the park and War Memorial, some of the beautiful churches along the Angara river, the main city centre streets and the statue of Alexander III - the Tzar responsible for the Trans-Siberian railway. Return to your hotel with free time for the rest of the day.

## DAY 15 - Fridays

### ON THE TRAIN

- Journey along the shore of Baikal through Buryatia & cross into Mongolia.

Early morning transfer to the station to catch your onward train. Today is usually the scenic highlight of the journey - a day of lake, forest and mountain views. After Irkutsk the train rumbles around the Southern shore of the stunning Lake Baikal often passing within a matter of meters of the lake and providing endlessly changing vistas. You will also notice a change in the people with many more Asian faces as you enter Buryatia which has strong cultural ties to Mongolia. This is a remote and pretty section of the trip with a hint of an old Asian culture ever present. Eventually you arrive at the Russia-Mongolia border at Naushki passing through the border formalities before continuing into the grasslands of Mongolia.

**NOTE:** The border crossing is slow and the your carriage will be detached from the Russian engine and join a Mongolian train. Whilst the train is stationary the toilets are locked! However, you can get off once the border formalities are complete and visit the facilities in the station building.

There is usually no dining car from the Mongolian border to Ulaanbaatar as the distance is short and through the night so make sure you have some provisions with you for any midnight munchies!

## DAY 16

### MONGOLIA

- Arrive in UB & transfer to the Bayan Gobi Sand Dunes & visit camel herders.

Arrival in Ulaanbaatar, the capital of Mongolia and a truly unique destination that is for many a real highlight of the trip. Your guide and driver will pick you up from the train station and to drive the 290 km (5 hours) to Bayan Gobi, an area of sand dunes, willow trees, streams and bushes with the appearance of a desert. This landscape is 80km long and the widest part of the sand dune is 10 km. Check-in and lunch at the Ger camp located near to the sand dunes.

In the afternoon, we will visit a local camel herder family at their Ger and experience their nomadic way of life.

The sand dunes are the perfect place for Bactrian camel riding. After becoming familiar with the equipment and the basics of riding a camel, explore the sand dunes for 1 hour atop these beautiful animals (note that if there is no time today you will ride tomorrow morning). Mongolia is home to 70% of the world's population of the two-humped Bactrian camels.

You also have the opportunity to explore the sand dunes on foot before returning to the Ger camp for dinner and a free evening.

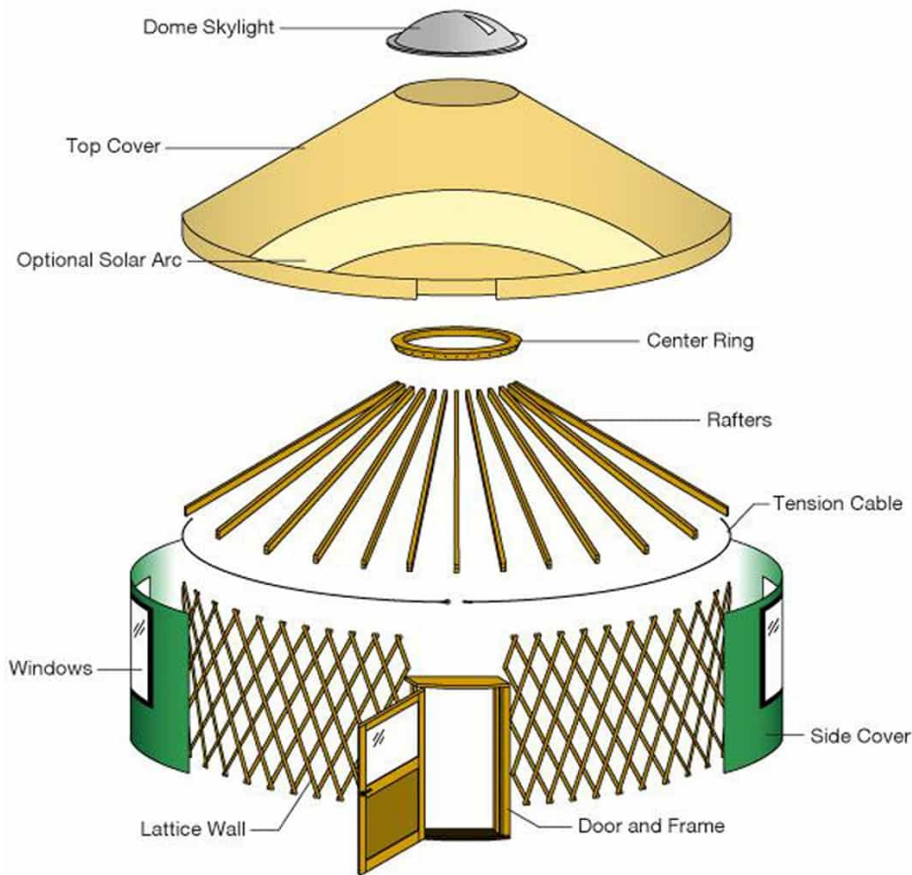

Mongolian gers, also known as yurts, are traditional round, portable dwellings used by nomadic herders in Mongolia for centuries. Made from a wooden lattice framework covered with felt and canvas, gers are designed to withstand Mongolia's extreme weather, from hot summers to freezing winters. They are easy to assemble and transport, making them ideal for a nomadic lifestyle. The interior typically includes a stove in the centre, with the layout reflecting Mongolian customs and family life. Today, gers are also a symbol of Mongolian heritage.

## MONGOLIAN GERS - DID YOU KNOW ?

- The design of the ger (yurt) dates back over 3,000 years, making it one of the oldest continuously used types of dwellings in human history.
- A ger can be disassembled and reassembled within an hour, making it ideal for the nomadic lifestyle of Mongolian herders.
- Gers are built to withstand Mongolia's extreme climate, from hot summers to harsh winters with temperatures dropping to  $-40^{\circ}\text{C}$  ( $-40^{\circ}\text{F}$ ). Layers of felt insulate the structure during winter and can be removed in summer.
- The ger's structure is made of a wooden frame and covered with felt made from sheep's wool, reflecting Mongolia's resource-efficient and environmentally friendly approach.
- The circular design allows for even distribution of wind and snow, making it more stable in Mongolia's vast and windy steppes.
- The stove, or hearth, is placed in the centre of the ger, symbolising warmth and family unity. It also serves as a central cooking and heating source.
- Tradition dictates that the door of the ger always faces south, providing protection from cold northern winds and ensuring sunlight during the day.
- The interior of the ger is organized according to Mongolian customs. The right side is traditionally for men and tools, while the left side is for women and household items. The north side is reserved for the altar and important family possessions.
- The ger is central to Mongolian hospitality. Visitors are always offered a seat on the left side, facing the family's most honoured possessions.
- Although rooted in tradition, modern gers can include solar panels, satellite dishes, and modern amenities, blending ancient customs with contemporary comforts.



# YOUR DETAILED DAY BY DAY ITINERARY

## DAY 17

### MONGOLIA

- **Karakorum & Erdene Zuu Buddhist Monastery & Lake Ugi.**

Following breakfast drive to 100 km to Mongolia's ancient capital of Karakorum founded by Chingis Khan in 1220. It quickly became a major trading hub on the silk road attracting merchants from across the Mongolian empire and beyond, prospering until Kublai Khan moved to the capital to modern day Beijing establishing what the Chinese refer to as the Yuan Dynasty. In 1379 much of Karakorum was badly damaged during an attack by the army of the Ming Dynasty.

After visit to the Museum of Karakorum, the symbolic ruins of the ancient city, we continue to visit the oldest Buddhist Monastery complex of Erdene Zuu which is surrounded by 108 stupas built in the 16th century. The monastery is still active, and there are temple museums and buildings where monks live and pray. Here you may hear monks chanting the Buddhist sutras.

In the afternoon, we make 60 km drive to Ugi Lake. This fresh water lake is 5km wide, 7km long and surrounded by steppe. The lake has many species of water birds and fish including perch and pike.

Relax at the camp with optional activities including hiking, swimming, kayaking and motor boat trips. Dinner and overnight at the Ger camp near to the shore of the lake.

### MONGOLIA

- Continue to Hustai National Park famous for it's Perzevalski wild horses.

After and early breakfast depart for the 280 km (5 hour) journey to Hustai National Park. This area is home to Mongolia's wild horse known as the Perzevalski Horse. The national park features mountain and steppe and has 450 species of plants, 200 of which are medicinal.

Check-in and lunch at the Ger camp near to the park gate with some time to relax. Visit a small museum to learn about the national park, wild horses and how they were reintroduced some years ago from European zoos.

The best time to observe these wild horses in their natural habitat is the hours before sunset during which they come down from the mountains to drink. We take a short drive and hike to see the horses. for what should be a great opportunity to take photos.

Besides the horses the scenery is beautiful mountain and steppe. Return to the Ger camp for dinner and a free evening.

## DAY 19

### MONGOLIA

- Travel to & explore Terelj National Park including the Genghis Khan Statue.

After breakfast we continue 230 km (4 hours) to Terelj National Park famous for its natural beauty of forested alpine mountains and unusual rock formations.

On the way, we stop at the Genghis Khan's Statue Complex in Tsonjin Boldog, which, at 40 meters, is the highest equestrian statue in the world. There are souvenir shops, a small museum and some other monuments in the base structure. From here, visitors can walk up by stairs or take an elevator to a deck on the horse's head for a panorama view over the complex area and surrounding steppe.

After lunch continue to Terelj National Park visiting Turtle Rock and a Buddhist mediation temple with 108 stairs and a wire bridge, called Temple of Ariyabal. This temple is surrounded by mountains with massive rock formations. From the top, you can enjoy the views across the park.

In the evening, we visit a local nomad family in their Ger to experience firsthand how people live in the steppe, a lifestyle which has not changed for centuries. You can talk with the family asking about their daily tasks to get an idea of how nomadic people live alongside their livestock. There is the opportunity to horseback ride also included before heading to the ger camp top overnight.

## DAY 20

### MONGOLIA

- Return to Ulaanbaatar for a city tour and folk show.

After breakfast return to Ulaanbaatar for a city tour starting with a visit to Zaisan Memorial Hill located on the south side of the City beside the Bogd Khan Mountain. Here there are the best views over the city.

After lunch near to Zaisan, continue to visit “Gandan” Monastery, which is Mongolia’s largest functioning Buddhist monastery including the Mongolian Buddhist University. The highlight of visiting to Gandan is 26 meter-high majestic gilded indoor statue of Megjid Janraisig.

Next we visit Sukhbaatar square which lies at the heart of the city surrounded by important buildings such as the government palace, banks and theatres and the central post office. There is a statue of national hero Sukhbaatar and a massive bronze statue of Genghis Khan and four warriors in front of Parliament House.

Finish the tour at your hotel and check-in with free time before finishing your time in Mongolia with a folk show showcasing traditional performances by singers, dancers and contortionists. It’s a unique chance to hear Khöömii (throat singing) and see the various national dresses of Mongolia. Return to the hotel to overnight.

## DAY 21 - Thursdays only

### BEIJING

- Continue by train through the Gobi to the Chinese Border.

Early morning transfer to the station to catch the train on to Beijing. The day is firstly spent in the steppe but that gradually gives way to the stoney Gobi desert - keep an eye out for camels! Evening arrival at the Mongolia-China border at Zamyun-Ude. The Mongolian exit formalities are completed on the train before a much longer stop on the Chinese side.

**NOTE:** Make sure you change up any Mongolian money you still have as once you leave Mongolia it becomes a souvenir rather than an exchangeable currency! On the Mongolian side border formalities are completed on the train. Whilst the train is stationary the toilets are locked. On the China side you are likely to be asked to get off the train (and sometimes with all your luggage) whilst the carriages are then taken into rail sheds to have their bogies (wheels) changed to the narrower Chinese gauge. The whole process can take several hours but there are station buildings to wait in.

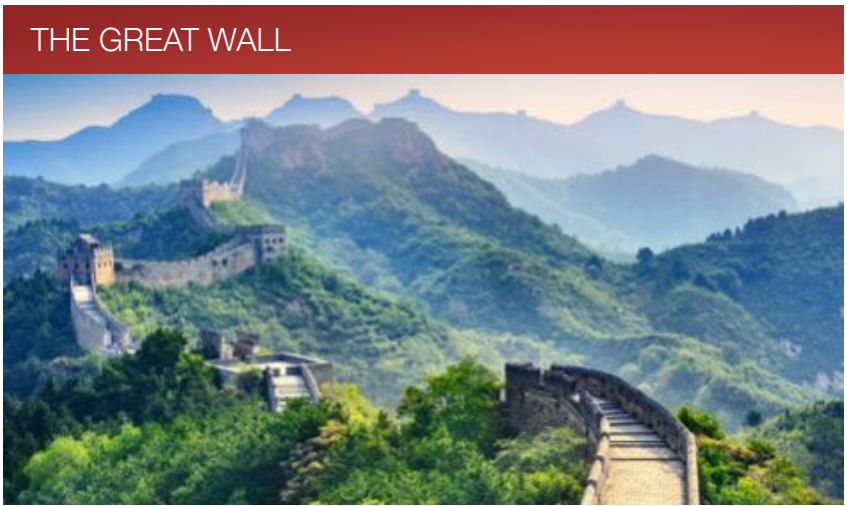

### BEIJING

The last stop today is at the Summer Palace to the west of Beijing. Dominated by Kunming lake it is as popular an escape from the city for today's Beijingers as it was for the Imperial court over the centuries.

## DAY 24

### BEIJING

- The Great Wall at Mutianyu & one of Beijing's Markets.

Today we will be showing you one of China's most famous sights - the Great Wall. We visit the dramatic and less crowded Mutianyu section 70km from Beijing set amongst spectacular mountain scenery. Dating back to the 6th Century and largely rebuilt in the 16th century during the Ming Dynasty it is one of the best preserved sections of the wall largely due to the high standard of construction. The tour includes cable car tickets cable up and down the Wall.

Also today, if you wish, we can take you to one of Beijing's many markets. Favourites are the Silk Market, Pearl Market and Panjiayuan antique market. If souvenir shopping isn't for you other options are the Hutong street of Nanluoguxiang, the 798 Dashanzhi contemporary art area or a quick look at the impressive 2008 Olympic Stadium. You can discuss which is right for you with us in advance or your guide on the day.

Return to your hotel for a free evening to enjoy Beijing further or ask us about cultural activities.

**NOTE:** Bring decent shoes, sunglasses and hat for the trip to the Wall and remember that it is always a good 5 degrees centigrade cooler at the Wall than in downtown Beijing.

# MAP OF THE GREAT WALL



- The Great Wall of China is estimated to be over 13,000 miles long (21,196 kilometres), including overlapping sections, making it the longest wall in the world and one of the most impressive architectural feats in history.

- Construction started in the 7th century BC, with various dynasties building and rebuilding it until the 17th century. The most famous sections were built during the Ming Dynasty (1368–1644).

- Originally built as a defensive structure to protect Chinese states and empires against raids and invasions from various nomadic groups, it also served for border controls and encouraged trade along the Silk Road.

- The wall was constructed using a variety of materials that were readily available in the different regions it traverses, including earth, wood, bricks, and stones. The method and materials used in construction varied significantly over time.

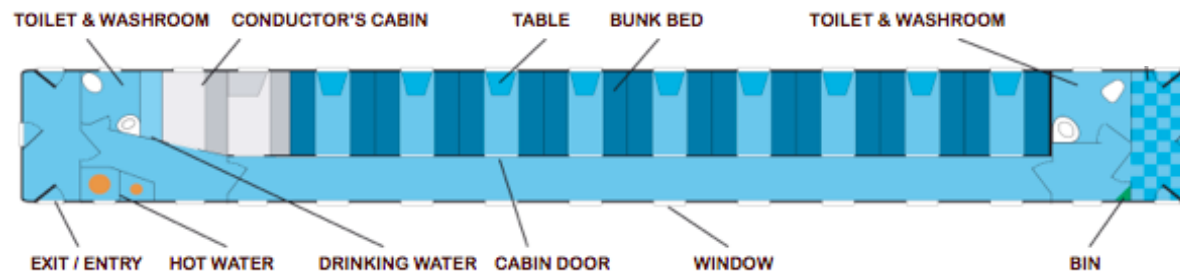
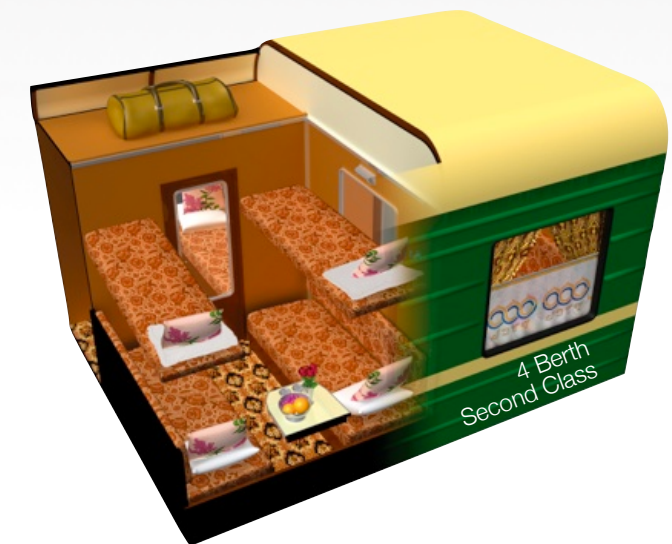
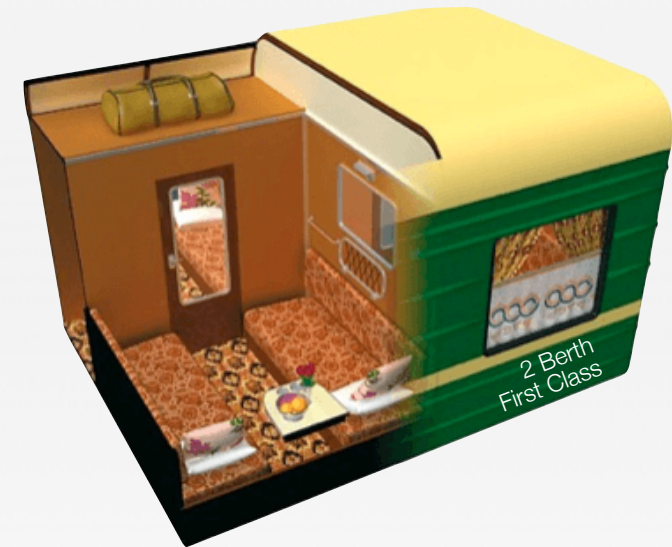

## VACCINATIONS

Vaccinations are generally not required for entry into Russia, but it is recommended to be up-to-date on routine vaccines like MMR (measles, mumps, rubella), diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis, and influenza. Additional vaccines to consider based on your activities and areas of travel include Hepatitis A (for food and water safety), Hepatitis B, Rabies (especially for rural areas), and Tick-borne Encephalitis if you plan to hike or camp in forested regions during the spring or summer.

## VISAS

Citizens from the United States, Canada, the UK, and EU, typically need a tourist visa to visit Russia. The visa application process requires an invitation letter (also known as a visa support document), a completed visa application form, a valid passport (with at least six months remaining after the visa expires), a passport-sized photo, and proof of travel insurance. Processing can take from a few days to several weeks, depending on the country and service chosen. This [Wikipedia link](#) is useful.

## WHEN TO VISIT

The best time to travel the Trans-Siberian Railway is late spring (May) or early autumn (September), when temperatures are mild, and landscapes are at their most scenic, with blooming flowers or vibrant fall colours. These months avoid the extreme cold of winter and the summer tourist season. June to August is also pleasant but busier, while winter (December to February) offers a magical snow-covered journey, though temperatures can drop below -20°C.

## ELECTRICITY & PLUGS

Russia uses 220V, 50Hz electricity. Plugs are Type C (European) and Type F, both with two round pins. These are standard in most European countries.

## MONEY TO TAKE

When visiting Russia, it's useful to carry Russian rubles (RUB) for smaller purchases, especially in rural areas. Major cities like Moscow and Saint Petersburg widely accept credit and debit cards. ATMs are readily available for cash withdrawals, and Visa and MasterCard are the most commonly accepted cards. It's advisable to exchange some currency before arrival or use ATMs for rubles. Inform your bank about your trip to avoid card issues abroad.

## VACCINATIONS

Vaccinations are not required for entry into Mongolia, but it's recommended to be up-to-date on routine vaccines like MMR, diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis, and influenza. Vaccines for Hepatitis A and Typhoid are advised due to potential food and water risks. Hepatitis B is recommended for extended stays, while Rabies and Tick-borne Encephalitis are recommended for rural travel. Consult your healthcare provider for personalised advice based on your itinerary and health needs before visiting Mongolia.

## VISAS

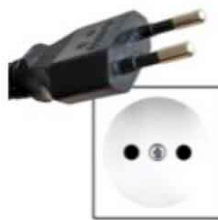
Mongolia allows citizens of 62 countries, including the U.S., Canada, and EU nations, to visit visa-free for 14 to 90 days depending on nationality. Travellers from other countries must obtain a 30-day tourist visa, which can be extended in Mongolia. Visas are available at Mongolian embassies and consulates. Check specific requirements before traveling, as policies vary based on nationality and travel purpose. This [Wikipedia link](#) is useful.

## WHEN TO VISIT

The best time to visit Mongolia is from June to September, with warm weather ideal for exploring the Gobi Desert, trekking, and camping. July is popular for the Naadam Festival, showcasing Mongolian culture. Temperatures range from 20°C to 25°C (68°F to 77°F). For cooler weather and fewer crowds, late August to early September is ideal, as the landscapes remain lush and travel conditions are optimal for outdoor activities.

## ELECTRICITY & PLUGS

Mongolia uses 230V, 50Hz electricity, with Type C and Type E plugs, which are common in Europe. Ensure your devices are compatible.

## MONEY TO TAKE

It's advisable to carry some Mongolian Tugriks (MNT), especially for use in rural areas where cash is preferred. In larger cities like Ulaanbaatar, credit and debit cards are widely accepted in hotels, restaurants, and shops. ATMs are available in urban areas for withdrawing local currency. It's recommended to exchange money at banks or official exchange counters, as foreign currencies are not typically accepted. Always carry some cash in remote regions.

## VACCINATIONS

Vaccinations are not typically required for entry into China, but we do recommend to be up-to-date on routine vaccines. Additionally, vaccinations for Hepatitis A, Typhoid Japanese Encephalitis, Rabies, and Yellow Fever may also be recommended but are not usually necessary for the usual places visited. Always consult a healthcare provider for personalised health advice before traveling, based on your itinerary and health history.

## VISAS

Visas are generally required for travellers entering China. Most visitors, including those from the UK, US, Canada, and European countries, must obtain a visa prior to arrival for tourism. There are a few exceptions, such as the 24-72 hour visa-free transit policy in certain cities for travellers from 53 countries but they usually don't apply to our tours. Always check the latest visa requirements with the Chinese embassy or consulate and [this Wikipedia link](#) is useful.

## WHEN TO VISIT

The best time to visit China largely depends on the region due to its vast size and varied climate. Generally, spring (April to May) and autumn (September to October) are ideal across most of the country, offering mild temperatures and minimal rainfall. These seasons are perfect for exploring both the urban cities and the countryside. However, for specific attractions like the Harbin Ice Festival, winter is the best time, despite the cold temperatures.

## ELECTRICITY & PLUGS

In China, the standard voltage is 220V with a frequency of 50Hz. The country uses types A, C, and I plug sockets, so travellers may need adapters.

## MONEY TO TAKE

When visiting China, it's wise to carry both cash and a card. While major cities accept credit cards, cash is essential in smaller towns and for local vendors. ATMs are widespread, but not all accept international cards. WeChat Pay and Alipay dominate digital payments, yet access requires a Chinese bank account or a difficult link to your bank. Carrying yuan (RMB) is recommended, especially for everyday transactions. Inform your bank prior to travel to avoid card issues.





## HOW FAR IN ADVANCE DO I NEED TO BOOK?

The Trans-Siberian can be quite a complex trip with a definite peak season when tickets and good hotel rooms can become scarce so we recommend booking as far in advance as possible if you are travelling from June to the end of September. Outside of this period we still recommend booking at least 2 months in advance to allow plenty of time to obtain the visas.

## CAN YOU OBTAIN THE VISAS FOR US?

We have a partnership with the visa agents [CIBT Visa Central](#) who will guide you through the visa application process. As you are likely to be obtaining more than one visa for a Trans-Siberian trip it makes sense to make use of a specialised visa agent who will do the leg work running between the various embassies.

## IS IT SAFE TO BOOK WITH YOU?

## WHAT IS THE BEST TIME OF YEAR TO TRAVEL?

The summer months from June to the end of August are generally considered the best and are certainly the busiest. However, catching the Autumn colours from early September is probably our favourite time to visit Russia although Mongolia can already be cold. China tends to be best in September and October although do try and avoid the week long National Day holiday during the 1st week of October. Don't forget that Siberia looks stunning in winter!

## DO YOU HAVE FINANCIAL PROTECTION?

## IS IT WORTH TRAVELLING IN WINTER?

Oh Yes! Siberia looks amazing, a ger stay in Mongolia is the definition of cosy and Beijing is cold but dry and sunny. All three countries are very used to dealing with winter making the experience more comfortable than you might think.

## DO THE TRAINS HAVE PLUGS FOR RECHARGING?

As a rule, yes although if there are 4 of you in a cabin you will need to take turns - or bring an extension plug! You can also ask your provodnitsas nicely if you can use her plugs but that will depend on the individual and they may expect a tip for this.

## IS TRANS-SIBERIAN TRAVEL SAFE?

Yes! In recent years we hear of very few problems either on the stops or the trains and there is no reason why you should not feel as safe if not safer than if travelling in your home country. This applies to men or women traveling alone and exercising reasonable common sense.





## WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN FIRST & SECOND CLASS?

First and second class cabins are the same size and tend to have similar facilities with the only real but big difference being that 2nd class cabins have 4 berths and first class 2 berths. So a couple get privacy and space in first class. A first class carriage will also have less competition for bathroom although this is not usually a big issue or a particular reason to go first class. Second class is arguably more social.

## WHAT HAPPENS ONCE WE MAKE A BOOKING?

On taking a booking we will confirm as many of the services as can be at that point and then ask you for a non-refundable deposit of 20% per person plus any international flights we are booking with the final balance payment due 60 days before your trip start date with us. On booking we will also offer advice about obtaining the visas and about 1 month before your trip with us starts we will send you our exclusive Trip Guidebook tailored to your specific trip with us.

## CAN YOU BOOK INTERNATIONAL FLIGHTS ?

Yes, as we hold an ATOL license (number 10287) we are permitted by the Civil Aviation Authority in the UK to book flights on behalf of our clients. We are a British Airways preferred operator but also book with other airlines to get the best deals and routes for our clients.

## WILL MY PHONE WORK ?

Yes and you will find coverage is surprisingly good all the way along the train routes and in cities. If you buy a SIM card make sure you are buying for the right phone system as some mobile companies in Mongolia, for example, operate on GSM (same as UK, Europe) and others CDMA (North America and Japan). You should also check what roaming charges will be with your mobile provider.
